SUBJECT: Joint Base Myer-Henderson Hall (JBM-HH) Policy Memorandum
DFMWR-3, Supervision of Minor Children within the JBM-HH Community

1. REFERENCES.

2. PURPOSE. To provide guidelines for supervision of children within the JBM-HH community, consisting of Forts Myer, McNair, and Henderson Hall.

3. APPLICABILITY. This policy applies to all personnel and family members within the boundaries of JBM-HH.

4. POLICY.

a. Military and DoD civilian sponsors are responsible at all times for the supervision, health, safety, and welfare of their family members and guests on the installation. Deliberate failure to provide for adequate and reasonable care of minor children may result in adverse consequences for the sponsor. These consequences may include, but are not limited to, criminal prosecution, civil liability, and/or termination of housing privileges on the installation.

b. The joint base guidelines for the supervision of a minor child are based on the child's age and grade in school. The attached Table 1 explains the level of supervision required for children in various situations and specifies the following:

(1) Children in the 4th grade and below require supervision at all times.

(2) Children in the 5th grade/11 years old are in a transitional year and may gradually begin to exercise self-care beginning with short periods of time, provided the parent/guardian believes the 5th grader/11-year-old is mature enough to exercise self-care. While exercising self-care for any length of time during this transitional period, children are required to have ready access to an adult as set up by their parent or guardian. Education by the military

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parent/guardian on self-care and safety is highly recommended prior to leaving the child alone for the first time, and then at regular intervals during the transitional period.

(3) Children in 6th–8th grade may be left home alone for up to 6 hours. Children in these grades (and 13-15 years old) may also babysit younger siblings. The completion of a babysitting course is required. They must have ready access to adult supervision.

(4) Children 13 – 15 years old may babysit children other than siblings. The completion of a babysitting course is required. A babysitting course is strongly recommended for children age 16 years and older who babysit.

(5) See Enclosure 1 for guidance on when children may be left home alone and left alone overnight.

c. Enclosure 2 provides conversions of ages to grades for home-schooled children.

5. PROCEDURES.

a. Child and Youth Services (CYS) will maintain a referral list of registered babysitters who are thirteen and older and who have completed a babysitting course.

b. CYS will maintain a resource list of activities both on and off the installation that are available options for supervision.

c. Every member of the joint base community is responsible for maintaining the highest possible safety standards. Each member should report information regarding known or suspected incidents of child abuse or child neglect. This is a matter of conscience and good faith and should be taken seriously.
